The "U!REKA Lab: Urban Commons" of the international U!REKA network of universities in Amsterdam, Edinburgh, Frankfurt, Ghent, Helsinki, Lisbon, Oslo, and Ostrava will host the 2021 Urban Commons School in Frankfurt. The event will bring together international and interdisciplinary students, teachers and researchers from different participating universities and beyond for an intensive exchange on the concept and practices of urban commons and commoning. Ideas and practices will be shared in lectures, workshops, presentations, performances, and exhibitions to further explore the political and social idea and ideal of commoning in urban spaces as a way to co-create, co-own and co-govern the resources of our cities.

The Urban Commons School will focus on the post-covid future of our cities and the role that practices of commoning and co-creation can play in the transformation and (re-)creation of urban spaces. A particular focus will lie on the host-city Frankfurt: on its existing urban commons initiatives as well as on new ideas, plans and project proposals for urban spaces that could be created and governed as urban commons. These ideas and impulses will be explored by international teams of young students, researchers and practitioners in Research Panels.

#### Urban Commons in the (Post-)Covid City: New Forms of Sustainable Cooperation and their Challenges

The Covid pandemic has underlined once again that contemporary cities face important social, environmental and economic challenges. Commoning practices show promising perspectives for addressing some of them. However, challenges remain in the sustainable organisation of these initiatives and their relationship to existing market and government practices.

Research Panel – Community and Governance

Covid closed many universities. Campuses looked empty and desolate without their academic purpose. This raises the question of whether universities are isolated islands or part of their environment. Couldn't university grounds

be used for the benefit of surrounding neighborhoods? Couldn't they be open, inclusive and welcoming to people who pass by or live close by? What is the significance of a university campus for the wider community and vice versa?

### Research Panel – Arts and Culture

What will the role of the arts and culture be in the (post-)covid city of the future? How can artistic interventions and socio-artistic participatory projects help to understand and shape a shared city and its social spaces? How could a commons-based creative and cultural transition of our cities work? We are going to visit typical places and urban commons initiatives in the city of Frankfurt to work on short artistic interventions, such as mapping, installation, performance, dance... The research panel will be THEORETICAL in the sense of thinking about the transformative role of the arts/culture: it will be PRACTI-CAL in the sense of creating aesthetic/ artistic interventions; it will be INVES-TIGATIVE in the sense of finding out about social spaces; and it will be ME-THODOLOGICAL, in the sense of exploring the potentials of artistic-ethnographic and participatory approaches.

## Research Panel - Urban Planning, Housing and Technology

### Current Trends in Housing in Central Europe

Stanislav Endel (TU Ostrava)

The lecture focuses on the most fundamental changes that have taken place over the last 30 years in the field of housing in Central European cities. Attention will be paid to the overall composition of the housing stock, the increase in the phenomenon of investment housing and the associated shortage of housing, which leads to



a high increase in residential property prices. A change in the structure of residential development and the ever-deepening phenomenon of suburbanization will also be discussed. This is also related to the general increase in the number of cars, to which cities must gradually adapt.

# → Comm-unity. Items From "a place to live" to a shared neighbourhood

During the interactive lecture, we discuss the conceptual framework of the Project Trans-Form from HO-GENT in the form of visions and concepts, ambitions and strategies for living together in a changing neighbourhood. We will challenge participants to get to work with the insights they have gained. Participants map out their ambitions towards their own context/practice and decide on the most fitting strategies/work out new strategies to give form to these ambitions.

#### Mov(ing) City

We invite all who are interested in working out the relationship between graphs and choreographies in a site-specific context. How can we move (like) our cities? Departing from Walter Benjamin's essay "The Task of the Translator" and

the Deleuzian notion of "desire-machines," this workshop proposes a line of research for "translator machines" that uses the body, writing and visual composition to think space and build new ways for space(s) to think us back, as a community, in the sense of Hannah Arendt's notion of a "common world".

#### **Common Singing**

Throughout human history, the sense of community has been, the most important feeling for leading humanity to its highest levels of civilization. Music, and choral singing in particular, have always played a decisive role in the motivation and sharing of well-being. This workshop will attempt to bring us all together in dreams and action towards a better world of personal responsibility and participation, sharing the enjoyment of our singing voices through common songs.

### Commons Movie Night

Film

The Commons Movie Night will provide a diverse program of short films

set in and focusing on the urban space of Frankfurt. The documentary "Zwischen dem Beton: Stadt Räume solidarisch / Between the Concrete: City Spaces Solidarity" (United we Talk) presents different Urban Commons initiatives. The more experimental and personal approach "Habibismore" (Theresia Plate) is a cinematic appropriation of the urban space by a BIPoC person. "As sobras" (Jonny Bucka, Agnetha Dunger) deals with the effects of the covid crisis on the art world. And "Das Beste haben wir rausgeschnitten/ We have cut the best parts" (Janika Kungl, Claudia Schultz) explores participatory film-making with the community of a self-organized trailer park. "Zwanzigstes Semester/ Twentieth Semester" (Patrick Kokoszynski) is an experimental exploration of the city space through the lens of a long-term student and his preoccupation with public book exchange shelves. The film screening will be introduced by Igor Karim (Goethe University), speaking about urban and anthropological filmmaking. What can art, what can cinema and participative documentary practice do to explore an urban commons future?

Feel, Think, Act, a project conceived by Cristiana Simões, Inês Silva and Liliana Dias, is a performance concert based on the Urban Commons ideas. We talk and sing about a wide variety of subjects, such as the courage to move from a place where we don't feel good, looking for something better; the cultural situation that we current-Iv live in; love and longing; capitalism and profit; environmental issues and, finally, the pain it gives us when we think about all of this.
